- ► London has 147 registered parks and gardens including eight Royal parks.
- There are more than 6m trees in London.
- The average personal daily water usage in London is 160 litres.
- Londoners produce 3.4m tonnes of rubbish a year.
- ► London has 14,000 alternatively fuelled cars, an increase of 670 per cent since 2003.
- ▶ This year, Madame Tussauds unveiled a new ecofriendly Prince Charles figure, made with clay and organic beeswax.
- ▶ London is an "urban heat island", with summer temperatures often 5-6C higher than the rest of the country.
- ▶ In March, the Thames was deemed clean enough to reintroduce salmon after a 200-year absence.
- ▶ Drivers in central London spend 50 per cent of their time in queues.
- London recycles 20 per cent of its rubbish.
