

A strip of dirt beside a busy roundabout at London's Elephant and Castle would not be most people's first choice of location to plant a row of lettuces. But then most people aren't Richard Reynolds (above), the figurehead of "guerrilla gardening" in the UK. "Guerrilla gardening" may conjure up an image of balaclava-clad bandits lurking in herbaceous borders, brandishing secateurs menacingly, but the affable Reynolds dispels all such thoughts as he explains his mission to bring plant life to neglected urban spaces. He argues that guerrilla gardening is a political act, a form of nonviolent direct action - much of his planting is viewed in British law as criminal damage - with its roots in the Digger radicals of the 17th century. By the end of his inspirational talk you'll be planning a night-time trip to the
