Eight killed by quakes in Spanish tourist area

At least eight people were killed last night when two earthquakes struck southeastern Spain in a region popular with British tourists.

Buildings, including an old clock tower, collapsed in the Murcian town of Lorca when a quake of 5.1 magnitude hit just before 7pm.

Last night authorities were trying to find accommodation and food for at least 10,000 people whose homes were either destroyed or rendered unsafe.

The epicentre of the first quake was Lorca. Tremors were also felt in other cities including Mazarrón, Cartagena, Águilas and as far away as Almería, Albacete and Madrid.

The Murcia region is popular with holidaymakers, many of whom go to play golf. There is also a big population of expatriate Britons, particularly in towns such as Manzanares.

Be a guerrilla Arm yourself with soil and seeds. Now the urban world's

your flowerbed, says **Richard Reynolds**

I'm a guerrilla. That's not a big, hairy ape but someone who does things a bit differently from the norm. In my case, that means gardening. I garden without boundaries because I have no garden. I plant all over my neighbourhood. mischievously popping flowers into places where they will explode into bloom unexpectedly: on roundabouts, beside pavements, on any spare patch of earth. It helps Nature, cheers up urban spaces and gives the bees something to savour as well. Why don't you have a go?

Seed Bombs

In one small projectile you have most of what a seed needs to grow, and you can reach places you couldn't otherwise. Plus, you can chuck it and run rather than hanging around digging.

To make your seed bomb, the simplest method is to mix soil, compost and wildflower seeds with a bit of water and roll it into small balls. It works better if the soil is clay-ey, so if you don't live in a

common in the south and east of Britain), then you may want to get to know a potter.

Let the bombs dry out for a day, then they are ready to throw. They work best in damp weather, but you could always follow up your bombing raid with a bit of precision firing with your water pistol. Be patient. Seed bombs are a gamble and wildflowers can take a while

Guerrilla Sunflowers

Sunflowers look good and are easy to grow. From one tiny seed you can have a giant yellow beacon in two months.

A packet of about 20 seeds costs no more than £2. Find some ground that's not too dusty or gravelly. Ideally it should be at least as deep as a hand, so there's room for the roots. Plant two seeds about 2cm down, cover them over and pour a mug of water on top. Return to water them a few times if you can. By late July they should be flowering, and they will last into October. Although sunflowers die in winter, the seeds will drop, providing food for animals — or even growing into new plants next year. guerillagardening.org
